My Inspiration and Our Example

"In the Spirit of Common Sense"

Do you know or remember the name Thomas Paine from American history? Are you familiar with the revolutionary writer's efforts on our nation's behalf? *The Second Coming of Common Sense* will either refresh or newly bring some of his writing to your attention and appreciation. His national vision, logical reasoning for the Common Good, personal bravery, and accomplishments for America, later for France, and undoubtedly for the world in general — serve as my inspiration and are at the heart of this effort for my fellow American citizens and our great country.

Thomas Pain was born in Thetford, England, on January 29, 1737. Just thirty-seven years later in 1774, the newly re-named Paine found himself in the New World, in the city of Philadelphia in the England's American colony of Pennsylvania. Thomas Paine came to the American colonies with letters of introduction from Benjamin Franklin, to whom he had been introduced while both were doing business in London.

The England born Thomas Paine was an experienced stay-maker (a maker of women's corsets) by trade having been trained by his father. Paine had also been a tax collector in England and had only limited writing experience. At personal risk and of his own free will, this regular colonist made himself into a revolutionary writer. He had only been in the American colonies for eighteen months when his radical pamphlet entitled *Common Sense* was first published in mid-January of 1776.

Only a few weeks after its first release, George Washington wrote on the message of *Common Sense*, to Joseph Reed of Pennsylvania on January 31, 1776:

"A few more of such flaming arguments, as were exhibited at Falmouth and Norfolk, added to the sound of doctrine and unanswerable reasoning contained in the pamphlet Common Sense, will not leave numbers at a loss to decide upon the propriety of a separation."

It was Benjamin Rush, one of the eventual signers of the Declaration of Independence representing the Pennsylvania colony that had the idea for Paine to write about the colonies breaking away from English rule. However, the writing contained in *Common Sense* was purely Paine's creation — his practical analysis of the day-to-day state of affairs that faced the American colonists.

In *Common Sense* he stated in the plain, everyday language of colonial America, the rationale for a complete break with England. Paine focused the consideration of the American colonial population on the pure, practical logic for separation from the Mother country.

A Revolution — by the People...

It was Paine's vision of the colonies' epic struggle against the "old order of things" and the regrettable, but necessary taking up of arms against their own countrymen in order to realize their dreams. Paine wrote that the growing colonial conflict with the English monarchy of King George III required,

"a declaration of independence"

He wrote on the Vision that became our Democracy and made the Challenge that led the colonists, our national ancestors to the war that created our nation...
