Honoring Those that Paid the Ultimate Price

My intent from the beginning of CS2 was to minimize the various statistics presented. We hear, read, and are bombarded with so many numbers and my goal is to present solid, objectively developed concepts and to promote common understanding among our people – words rather than numbers.

However, then I began writing this piece on our Civil Wars and wanted to communicate some sense of the human loss, the level pain and suffering that our predecessors had endured for the good of the nation.

So I looked for the human numbers and located a very detailed statistical chart on the Internet. It was too much! It charted <u>all</u> the wars and conflicts that our military people have bravely fought since 1775, listing the harsh counts of all those Americans that had died and were wounded.

I felt they all had to be acknowledged in CS2. Those sacred numbers represent the men and women that bravely sacrificed themselves for us over the years, and those that unfortunately are doing so even today.

My hope and prayer are that each of us will quietly study those solemn numbers. That those *most human* statistics would provide each of us a real perspective on *true sacrifice* to consider as we individually ponder the potential for personal loss, if any, that you and I could realize from the implementation of the proposals in An American Agenda and others to come.

Most people will benefit more than they may lose, if they lose anything at all. However, some will absolutely experience personal loss and/or upsetting adjustments in their personal world in the order for the Common Good to be truly served. Such is the very nature of dramatic, public Changes in our or any nation's National System.

Such societal Changes are always happening in the world, but most are not of a positive nature.

The Real Bottom Line

In reviewing those numbers, I was most personally struck when considering the *total* number of our people that have, and unfortunately to this very day are dying – for the welfare of the rest of us.

In reviewing the full chart of all military actions that America has been involved in since 1776 the number of military men and women that lost their lives exceeds some 1,262,000 — a very sobering number.

For perspective, I determined to calculate the cost in lives spread from 1776 to the end 2008, the next presidential election year – which totals 232 years and over 84,680 days. Continuing the grim math it first equates to 5,439 people lost per year.

And finally it calculates to some **14.9** of our military people <u>lost each day</u> from 01-01-1776 <u>thru</u> 12-31-20<u>08</u>!

A loss of **14.9** real people for each of our nation's **84,680** days.

Just think of all the tears!

And What of Today

And now our military is facing Bush IIs optional and "out of control" Iraq War. Through 2-4-08 it has taken 3,948 lives,

and is now averaging over two (2) lost each day since 3-19-2003.

Consider that in just the Iraq War to-date, all of the lives lost, bodies and minds wounded, and families forever damaged. It is far too much pain. And it is avoidable national pain. We can <u>and we will</u> do better than that in the future. And We must demand it!
